

What should I know about Testicular Cancer ?

Testicular cancer affects the testicles but if left unchecked can spread to other areas of the body such as the lungs.

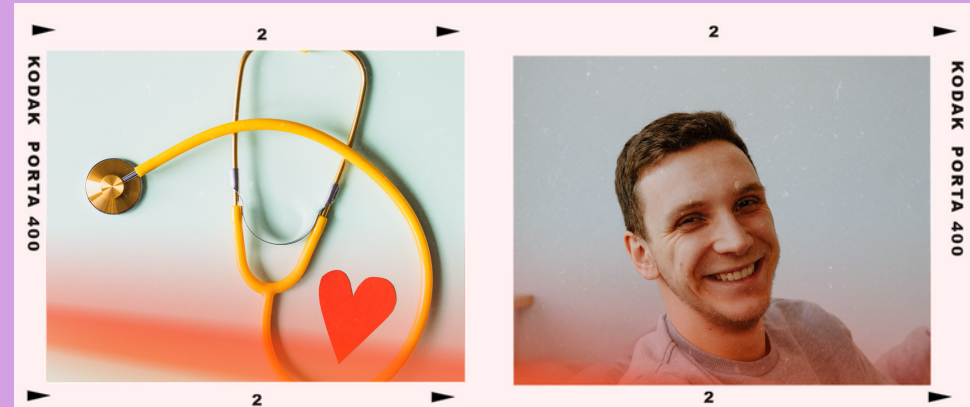
Symptoms can include:

- A painless and small lump on a testicle or an enlarged testicle
- Ache in the stomach or groin area
- Rapid and sudden accumulation of fluid or blood in the scrotum

Risk factors can include:

- Young men between the ages of 15 to 35 are at most risk
- White men are at higher risk than African-American/Black and Hispanic/Latino men
- Family history of testicular cancer
- Undescended testicle
- Klinefelter's Syndrome
- Abnormal testicle development
